Rector's Annual Report: Parish of Saint Luke's Hubbards and Saint Mark's Mill Cove

The Rev'd Taunya J. Dawson, Rector

By the time we hold our Annual General Meeting, I will have been your Rector for almost a full year. I am sure it has been a year of change in all of our lives. Perhaps the most significant change has been the gradual "return to normal" following the easing of COVID-19 restrictions. The pandemic placed stresses and pressures on all of us, both individually and institutionally. And while we perhaps all recognize that the "new normal" is not necessarily going to be what the old normal was, we will face challenges as we try to discern the way forward.

I have had the opportunity to meet so many people – from the stalwarts who never seem to miss a Sunday, to the stillfaithful, who either cannot easily leave their homes, or who are still

hesitant about coming back to Sunday worship. Offering livestream worship has helped some of these to stay in touch; I hope that the on-line images of our windows and banners has provided comfort. Others have been grateful for the ability to receive Holy Communion at home. Our Shoreham outreach also continues to bring the Church to those who can't come to it.

But I have also had the chance to meet people all around this community. Whether they come to church or not, there are many people who are looking for answers, want to talk, or are just in need of human contact. I have been touched by the universally friendly nature of the people in our communities. There have been so many memorable events over the past year. The baptisms of Eleanor Marion Elson and Daniel Ryan David Burke. Rev'd Jerry's ordination, and my own institution and installation. The variety show and the Christmas concert. The Two Coves café, the boxed lunch initiative, the Spring yard sale, and the Christmas sale. Blessing and installing our new prayer boxes. Making our Church Hall wheelchair accessible. So much effort and energy – by so many people!

We have also said our goodbyes to people over the past year. Funerals are a part of our Parish life; along with events such as the "Memory Tree" service at Saint Mark's.

As winter slowly recedes, and days get longer, our Church year moves into the season of Lent, which will culminate in Christ's death and resurrection. I sense that this parish perhaps feels the annual cycle in a unique way. In cold weather, Saint Mark's closes its doors, and Saint Luke's moves into the cozier quarters of "winter church." And then, we rise again! I hope that this will be a time for all of us to look inward, and consider the vows that we have made as baptized Christians. In my sermons, I know that I have frequently talked about "the road to Jerusalem." It is that rocky uphill path, which takes us away from our everyday comforts, to travel with Jesus. And after Easter, we face the challenge to travel out of Jerusalem and spread the Good News.



In our Covenant, we quoted a former Archbishop of Canterbury: "The church exists for those who are not yet members." And we have committed to "look beyond the walls of the Church." The first two of the "five marks of mission" of the Anglican Church of Canada are "To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom," and "To teach, baptize and nurture new believers ". Without the first, we risk becoming inward-looking and irrelevant. Without the second, we risk becoming extinct within a generation. So, I

believe that – as a priority – we need to gather in more

disciples, in order to grow the Kingdom here in this parish.

This involves reaching out to members of our congregation who have not yet come back to Church after COVID. It involves reaching out to our friends, neighbours and colleagues, to share with them the Good News that perhaps sometimes we assume that they already know! And most of all, it involves living a prayerful, charitable and Christian life; both for its own sake, but also for others to see.

<u>Two Coves Café</u> – Hosted by Clair McInnis and Carol Simms, this Outreach provides a place to go once a week, for fellowship, good conversation, a hot beverage, muffins and maybe a game of crib. are also delivered once a week, and homemade soup once a month to those who can't go out or who just need a bit of love. With the generous donations generated from the cafe, we have contributed to the following: 1. PWRDF - \$200 for Hurricane Fiona relief for the Atlantic Region.

2. PWRDF - \$200 for Pakistan relief.

3. Needy local family - \$500 to a local family who are struggling with finances.

4. New signage at St. Luke's - \$500 to make us more visible to our community.

5. Portable ramp at St. Luke's - \$500 to make our hall more accessible.



6. Gas Gift card - \$100 to local family to help with travel expenses for cancer treatments.

7. Christmas Family - \$500 gift cards for local needy family who are struggling. Thank you to everyone who so generously give at Two Coves Cafe! ALL ARE WELCOME!

<u>Bag Lunches</u> - 102 lunches were prepared and sold in August during The World Junior Sailing Championships. Thank you to all who contributed.

<u>**Parish Gardens**</u> – Catherin Chandler and Rev. Jerry Cavanaugh created a flower garden in St. Luke's Church yard. Perennials and sunflower seeds were planted in the garden. Mother nature provided the right conditions to encourage the growth of a wonderful harvest.

Brenda Munro donated packs of seeds and made them

available to our parishioners. With each pack of seeds, a prayer was attached, "Lord God, protect Ukraine and give her strength, courage, faith and hope Amen". The idea was to say this prayer, as the seeds are planted. \$156.30 was raised from the sale of the seed packets which went to Outreach and subsequently was donated to The Primates World Relief and Development fund. The Brownies and Sparks, under the direction of Catherin

Chandler, transplanted sunflower seeds along the front steps of St. Luke's. Thank you Rev. Jerry Cavanaugh, Brenda Munro and Catherin Chandler.
